Fiberglass pools, on the other hand, are smoother and less reactive, but still benefit from proper balance to avoid staining or gel coat damage. Vinyl-lined pools require their own considerations, as certain chemical imbalances can cause fading or liner wrinkling.

Water disinfection methods also affect water balance and maintenance needs. **Traditional chlorine systems** are widely used and effective but can require frequent dosing and stabilizer control. **Saltwater chlorinators** convert salt into chlorine automatically, offering convenience and softerfeeling water, but can still be harsh on surfaces if the water isn't properly balanced. **Magnesium-based systems**—often marketed as mineral pools—are gentler on skin and eyes, though they still require the same attention to LSI and water parameters to avoid corrosion or scaling.

fewer chemical corrections, longer-lasting pool surfaces and equipment, and fewer problems to troubleshoot. It also means a more enjoyable swimming experience for you and your family.
